### From the Presidents Desk

Why is the Citizenship and Governance Working Group asking community members to fill out the Self Identification Surveys?

As part of advancing negotiations with Canada for rights and recognition, AWN needs to review and possibly modify or update membership criteria, and develop a more comprehensive membership list. At the September Negotiation table, Canada said negotiations can't advance until AWN is able to answer key government questions about who makes up AWN. One way the Working Group is gathering information for this work is through Self Identification Surveys. **Thank you to all who contributed to advancing the negotiation table by filling one out!** 

#### What's the problem?

AWN is a *non-status* community (not an Indian Act band). Due to this, Canada has claimed, <u>since at least 1998</u>, that they 'don't know who AWN is.' Fair or not, AWN needs some way of demonstrating to governments that AWN is an **Indigenous rights-holding group**.

#### The Purposes of the Self Identification Survey are:

To provide a more complete estimate of current membership so we can show Canada if we choose to, and so we are not recommending membership changes based on problems that don't actually exist once we have more complete information.

#### We all know the current AWN membership list is incomplete because:

- No people under 18 are included, as AWN is a non-profit organization under the Alberta Societies Act, and
- Some people are members of the coops and enterprises, or descendants of the "Native Settlers" in Grande Cache, but are not on the AWN list because they have consciously chosen not to sign up, or because they did not realize they could or should.
- To provide us with information that will help us answer what are likely key government concerns about negotiating
  with a non-status Indigenous group like AWN, such as issues of Indigenous ancestry, dual registration, certainty,
  scope and limits.
- To provide us with more information to help us demonstrate to governments or courts etc. Some key features we all know exist but they do not currently see, as a shared historical and continuing culture, that show AWN is an **Indigenous rights-holding group** based on the most recent federal definition.

#### **Indigenous rights holding group:**

Canada has recently stated that, "as set out by the courts" an Indigenous nation or rights holding group is defined as:

a group of Indigenous people sharing critical features such as language, customs, traditions, and historical experience

at key moments in time like first contact, assertion of Crown sovereignty, or effective control [note: these times are from Aboriginal law court cases].

It is essential for land claim negotiations that AWN be able to demonstrate more clearly who makes up the community AND that this community shares "critical features such as language, customs, traditions, and historical experience":

In Aboriginal cases involving Metis peoples, the Court has made comments that a group should not be "of recent vintage" and membership in a Metis organization might not be enough to meet the *Powley* test (the legal test for Metis Aboriginal rights). Remember Canada is pretending they know NOTHING about AWN, which is technically just a non-profit organization under the Alberta societies act, like a social club.

• AWN likely needs to demonstrate that it is not just a social club that any Indigenous individual can join (like a Friendship Centre or the Congress of Aboriginal Peoples), but rather is a group that has a long shared culture and history together through time. Luckily, we know this does exist. The issue is how do we demonstrate this to those who do not know everyone here.



## From the Presidents Desk

Are the Self Identification Surveys contrary to the Charter or Human Rights Codes?

At the February 16<sup>th</sup> AWN AGM, it was stated that the surveys were contrary to community members' human rights.

AWN has discussed this matter with our own legal counsel. The Charter and Human Rights legislation in Alberta operate to protect individuals from discriminatory treatment, including discrimination based on race, religion, and gender (among other things). It is critical to understand that the information being collected in these surveys has not been used by AWN to differentiate between members of cooperatives and enterprises for any reason.

The only purpose for gathering this information is to provide information to the working group that is studying potential options for a membership code for the community as a whole. This information will only be used to address government questions about "who" AWN is and to inform discussions taking place at the working group, and ultimately, the community, as it considers how to formally reconstitute our Nation. It will be up to the community as a whole to decide what kind of membership code best reflects our community.

## Citizenship and Governance

AWN is happy to announce a Research Partnership Agreement relating to Citizenship and Governance work between AWN and the University of Alberta Wahkohtowin Indigenous Law and Governance Lodge, which is an initiative through the Faculties of Law and Native Studies. It is co-led by Dr. Hadley Friedland (Law) and Dr. Shalene Jobin (Native Studies) and funded through a generous grant from the Alberta Law Foundation.

#### **Highlights include:**

- Up to \$80 000.00 in funding support for community-led research, education and engagement,
- Support and research assistance, including assistance in the form of Indigenous Citizenship and Governance resources, educational opportunities and clear language resources for the working group and the community-at -large,
- Support and practical assistance developing cultural pride and community building initiatives, like community gatherings, youth-led film project, communication plan and positive social media campaign
- Community engagement and education on citizenship and governance topics over the spring/summer months.

This remains a community-led project, and all university partnered work will be returned to the community. More information can be found on the AWN website.

## TRADITIONAL LAND USE

### **Consultation Update**

February had an increase in the amount of applications coming though the Consultation office, but it is still a slow time. We have reviewed Oil and Gas projects for Tourmaline, Shell, Modern Resources, 7Gen, Kicking Horse, Peyto, Paramount Resources, Delphi Energy, NuVista, Jupiter, CNRL and Cenovus. We also reviewed a Forestry GDP for Weyerhaeuser.

There were no consultation site visits conducted in February 2019.

### Weyerhaeuser Open House

Weyerhaeuser came to Grande Cache to present their 10-year harvest plan to the community in February. Several people came out to ask questions, learn about the plan, and eat a fantastic soup and bannock lunch.

### Red Rock-Prairie Creek and Narraway Caribou Plan Update

For several years now Aseniwuche Winewak Nation, Weyerhaeuser, and the Canadian Park and Wilderness Society (CPAWS) have been working together to develop effective caribou range plans for the Redrock-Prairie Creek and Narraway caribou herds as a portion of the ranges overlap with the Weyerhaeuser Forest Management Area. Over that time period, important progress has been attained as we work to develop caribou range plans. Stephanie and Vivian attended a meeting on February 12 in Edmonton with Weyerhaeuser and Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society (CPAWS), at which time CPAWS, due to their guidelines and mandate, informed the working group they could not support harvesting lumber in the Caribou Range and would no longer be involved in the project. AWN will continue to work with Weyerhaeuser on their plans and continue to provide input in the harvesting plans in the Caribou Range.

## **Elders Council**

### **AWN Elder's Tour Foothills Forest Products Sawmill**



On Monday, February 25<sup>th</sup>, 2019 AWN Elders Jane McDonald, Mabel Wanyandie, Colin Moberly, and Lawrence Joachim toured Foothills Forest Products Operations Mill.

After a brief orientation, the tour started off in the log yard area and moved inside the sawmill, where the Elders saw how logs are cut into rough dimensional lumber and how it's sorted and packaged into different lengths. Then it was explained the rough lumber is placed in kilns to dry the lumber.

The tour continued onto the basement area where wood pellets are produced. It was explained the pellets are produced from Planer shavings. The tour continued into the Saw Filer's area where the Elder's got to hear and see how various laws are maintained.

In tour of the Planer Mill area, Elder's got to see how the rough dry lumber is processed through the Planer. Where the lumber is nearing its final stages, the rough lumber is transformed into clean smooth lumber, that's sorted by grade and various lengths. Once it's packaged, not all loads are wrapped. It was explained economy loads are not wrapped. The finished packages are placed in the lumber yard, ready for sale, then shipped by truck or rail to customers.

All of the Elders shared their past experiences working in sawmills. They all spoke about most of the work in the past was done manually. They saw how technology has changed the way the work is completed today. Many thanks to Foothills Forest Products team; Mark Stevens, General Manager/lead tour guide for setting up the tour with our AWN Elders. Victoria Strowbridge for orientation, Ron Delorme a tour guide/translator on the entire tour, Larry Delorme, explaining in Cree the log yard process, Robert Wanyandie and Diane Delorme explaining in Cree about the Planer process.



## Did you know

## News of the Nation, 23 years Strong

The very first AWN newsletter was released 23 years ago in March 1996! The issue was four pages long and single sided.

Mary Delorme and Mike Moberly Jr. provided content for it, like articles and Cree syllabics. The Editor at the time was Doris McDonald and Linda Delorme was the Administrative Assistant and assisted with the completion of it.

Since then the Newsletter has evolved into a key component to AWN's history. It has grown so much over the years. Our community and industry friends look forward to receiving it each month. Its also featured on our website www.aseniwuche.com. We have also began a Go Paperless campaign to encourage members to switch to email copies. Thank you everyone that has contributed to the AWN newsletter over the years and hopefully it continues for another 23 years at least!



The Aseniwuche Winewak enjoyed a rich traditional lifestyle before the 1960's. They lived off the land as hunters, trappers and guides. In 1910, the government created Jasper National Park. The People who had traditional homesteads in the Jasper area were forced to relocate. Some families were bought out, others were forced out. As the People left for the Grande Cache and Hinton areas, they were promised to be left alone. The promise was short-lived, with an attempted eviction from Grande Cache and Hinton in 1912. Despite the adversity, our people did continue living in the area, building homes, hunting and fishing, even farming. But encroachment continued: William Switzer Provincial

Park was created in 1958 and Willmore Wilderness Park in 1959. This removed more land. Today, the parks still contain and control sites with significant historical, cultural and ecological value.

In 1969 the Willmore Wilderness Park was reduced in size and the Town of Grande Cache was built. The modern world had arrived on the front doorstep, and the People had nowhere to go. The new town would have an adverse and permanent impact on our traditional way of life. As the town grew, hunting & trapping resources declined, while jobs became more technologically advanced. Most of the People did not adapt well to the rapid change in lifestyle and values. But, a strength within remained: despite overwhelming odds, and with no on-going financial support, the community formed the modern Aseniwuche Winewak Nation of Canada in 1994.



The Program offers Scholarships to students in three categories, including 75 scholarships specifically for Indigenous students:

**TransCanada Indigenous Legacy Scholarship** (75 scholarships at \$5,000 each) - awarded to Indigenous (First Nation, Métis, Inuit) students pursuing any full-time, post-secondary program at a registered education institute.

**TransCanada Community Leaders Scholarship** (100 scholarships at \$2,500 each) - awarded to students who demonstrate a strong commitment to their communities through volunteerism, leadership and other activities.

**TransCanada Trades Scholarship** (100 scholarships at \$2,500 each) - awarded to students who are studying skilled trades relevant to our business.

### **Educational Assistance for AWN Community Members**

#### **Policy**

Aseniwuche Winewak Nation has established an educational assistance program to provide financial assistance to AWN members enrolling in post-secondary education. The purpose of the educational assistance program is to encourage recipients to continue their education after completing high school.

#### **Procedures**

The AWN Board will determine annually the amount of funds available for educational assistance when the annual operating budget is accepted. The budget for educational assistance will contain two categories: college and university and trades/apprenticeship.

#### To be eligible to receive financial assistance, applicants must:

Be an AWN member and a resident of the Grande Cache area Cooperatives and Enterprises or Town of Grande Cache. Have completed the requirements for high school graduation in Alberta or receive mature student status from the educational institution being applied to.

Educational assistance will be awarded as follows: Trade or apprenticeship — maximum \$800 per year College or technical school — maximum \$2000 per year University — maximum \$3000 per year
